


Back to Basics: Basic Training on the Basic Menu

I've got some good news for you: you may not know it, but the developers of the LMS from SumTotal included a very cool feature in the system that most people don't seem to know or recognize. It will not only save you a lot of time, but will also streamline your learning activity creating process. Lucky for you, however, I know about this feature. I can tell you how to find it and start using it in just a few minutes. This is good, I suppose, because if I didn't, this would be a pretty short article, wouldn't it?

Many administrators I talk with seem to spend a lot of time in the learning management system (LMS) creating learning activities. And, if you are an administrator, you probably already know that the page where they spend the bulk of this time is the Learning Activity Properties page. This page has what we call the "center menu," which you can see below.



Most users seem to automatically just click the "Switch to advanced view" button, but did you know you can easily change which properties are shown in the basic menu and create different settings for each learning activity type? This is terrific because when you are working with an instructor-led class you typically need properties like schedule, location, and instructor. (Note: Instructors are always good to have in an instructor-led class ...) In contrast, however, for something like online training, you don't need any of those properties -- you need properties like web-based training, instead.



Streamline Learning Activity Creation

Establishing which properties are shown in the basic menu for a learning activity type really streamlines the work for learning activity creators. Instead of wasting time fishing around or wondering if displayed properties apply or not, a basic menu made especially for learning activity creators will keep them focused on just the properties that they need to do their jobs. Oh, and if you want to get some good will, be sure to let them know how many minutes -- er, hours -- changing the menu took you ...

Preventing Mistakes


Establishing a basic menu can also help prevent mistakes. Since only the properties that should be set for that specific learning activity type are displayed, there should be no need to switch to advanced view, which makes it much less likely that something will be set incorrectly. In fact, in this scenario, switching to the advanced view should actually become a red flag that they may be trying to set a property they shouldn't.

For example, an instructor-led *class* needs a start and end date. However, if you accidently set a start and end date for the instructor-led *course*, the entire course -- and, more importantly, every single one of its classes -- will disappear from Learner mode on the end date. Oopsie! Unfortunately, this is an easy mistake to make when you're bouncing back-and-forth between courses and classes. But, if you set the basic menu properly, the need to switch to advanced view can be a warning that you may be doing something wrong.


Establishing the Basic Menu

Now that you know how valuable establishing your basic menus can be, let's talk about the steps needed to actually do it. And now I have even more good news: if you were delighted with the benefits of the basic menu, you'll be even more delighted to find out that establishing it is very easy.


First, you'll need to log in under an account that has permissions to work with learning activity types. Then, in Administrator mode, under the Learn menu, choose Learn Configurations then Activity Types.



On the Activity Types page, you'll see a list of all the learning activity types available in your LMS implementation. Simply click the pencil icon associated with the learning activity type whose basic menu you want to establish.




In this example, we've selected ILT Class. On the first Set Activity Type Properties page, simply click Next.





On the second Set Activity Type Properties page, select the properties you want to specify as mandatory (if any), and then click Next.



On the third Set Activity Type Properties page, select the properties you want to appear in the ILT Class-specific basic menu, and then click Finish.



Next ... oh wait, there is no "next". That's it! I told you it was simple, didn't I?



Showing the Proper Properties

So which properties should you show in the basic menu? There is no set answer for that -- it really just depends on the business processes you've established within your organization. But don't sweat it; make your best guess, work with those settings for a while, and then go ahead and make changes as you discover what needs to be altered.

Also, for a detailed guide on how all learning activity properties should be set, depending on the learning activity type, we offer the "Creating Learning Activities and Structures in the LMS." We don't like to brag -- well, we don't like to brag TOO much -- but this guide has been extremely well-received.
